National Day of Prayer

I hope you and your families find yourselves well and in good spirits.

The National Day of Prayer is an annual observance held on the first Thursday of May, inviting people of all faiths to pray for the nation. It is a day which transcends differences, bringing together people from all backgrounds. The National Day of Prayer is a significant part of our heritage. Since the first call to prayer in 1775, when the Continental Congress asked the colonies to pray for wisdom in forming a nation, the call to prayer has continued through our history. It was created in 1952 by a joint resolution of the United States Congress and signed into law by President III. Bro. Harry S. Truman.

In 1988, the law was amended and signed by President Reagan, permanently setting the day as the first Thursday of every May. Each year, the president signs a proclamation, encouraging all Americans to pray on this day.

The past few weeks, our country was both separated and united. Each of us experienced this situation in mostly the same way. We have been isolating ourselves and family, have designated one individual to travel for provisions in order to minimize exposure, and all have sat in front of the TV hoping for a resolution and return to normalcy. Unfortunately, COVID-19, as with the flu will remain as part of our normal lives after the pandemic is controlled.

This unseen enemy ravaged our homeland with illness and death resulting in a new or renewed prospective on how we lead our lives and protect our loved ones. 

Harry S. Truman

President



MWB Harry S. Truman was a statesman who served as our 33rd President; taking the office upon the death of Franklin D. Roosevelt. A World War I Veteran, MWB Truman assumed the presidency during the waning months of World War II and the beginning of the Cold War.

MWB Truman is known as one of the most dedicated men to have joined our Crafts ranks. He was a member of a number of Masonic Orders, often while serving in the role of United States Senator, Vice President, and even while serving as the President.

He received his Entered Apprentice Degree at Belton Lodge No. 450 in Belton, Missouri on February 9, 1909.

He had entered the Scottish Rite Lodge of Perfection and Chapter Rose Croix in Kansas City in 1912 and completed the Scottish Rite Degrees in 1917 before going on active duty. He was honored by being coroneted as a 33° Honorary, in October, 1945.

In 1919, through the York Rite, MWB Truman received the Chapter and Council degrees in Kansas City. In 1923, he was also honored as a Knight Companion of the Red Cross of Constantine in Mary Conclave, Kansas City.

MWB Truman was created a Noble of the Mystic Shrine in Ararat Temple, Kansas City in 1917. He served as Orator of the Temple in 1933 and Second Ceremonial Master in 1934. After his election to the United States Senate that year, he had to resign from the divan line due to his Grand Lodge and official duties.

He was appointed District Deputy Grand Master and Lecturer for the newly formed 59th Masonic District in 1925, serving until 1930. Shortly after this, he entered the Missouri Grand Lodge line and served the state as Grand Master in 1940-41. He was only the second Masonic President to serve as a Grand Master.

It was during MWB Truman's term that the Missouri Lodge of Research was reorganized. He served as Master of that Lodge in 1950, while he was President.

On December 26, 1972, MWB Harry S. Truman died at 88 years of age. The last rites took place on December 28, 1972 mainly from the stage of the auditorium of the Harry S. Truman Library. It is the right of every Mason to have a Masonic service. But, this was not to be. Despite his wishes, the protocol which takes place with the death of a President didn't allow a Masonic funeral service.

The Masonic portion of his service was limited to five minutes. And, he was almost even deprived of that. MWB W. Hugh McLaughlin was told he would be limited to five minutes for his presentation to a nationwide television audience. The Grand Master was given an enormous task which he did in the time allotted. Many of the important points covered in the last rites of the Masonic Fraternity were woven into MWB McLaughlin's address. It has been said, that MWB Harry S. Truman, President of the United States, would have been pleased.

Loyalty Day

The holiday was first observed in 1921, during the First Red Scare. Originally called "Americanization Day," it was intended to replace the May 1 ("May Day") celebration of the International Workers' Day.

Loyalty Day was first celebrated in the 1920's. Communism was on the rise, and dreaded in United States. At the time, May Day (May 1st) was perceived by some citizens as a Communist holiday. Loyalty Day was intended to counter this sentiment.

The United States was founded by patriots who risked their lives to bring freedom to the nation. We remember our nation's founders on Loyalty Day, which is a day when people celebrate their freedom while remembering their responsibilities to continue the inheritance of liberty.



On this day, we have an opportunity to reaffirm our loyalty to our country. In proclaiming this day, President George W. Bush wrote: "We express allegiance to our Nation and its founding ideals, we resolve to ensure that the blessings of liberty endure and extend for generations to come." We should also take a moment to appreciate the members of our armed forces who are displaying the ultimate in loyalty and service to protect our freedoms and liberty, and our way of life.

On May 1, 1930, around 10,000 Veterans of Foreign War staged a rally at New York's Union Square to promote patriotism. Through a resolution adopted on May 1, 1949, it evolved into Loyalty Day. Observances began on April 28, 1950, and peaked on May 1, when more than five million people across our nation held rallies. In New York City, more than 100,000 people rallied for the United States of America.

The U.S. Congress designated this an official holiday on July 18, 1958 with the signing of Public Law 85-529. Then President III. Bro. Dwight D. Eisenhower, proclaimed May 1, 1959 the first official observance of Loyalty Day.




