





## Flag Day



The first celebration of the U.S. Flag was held in 1877 on the 100th anniversary of the Flag Resolution of 1777. However, there is believed the first annual recognition of the flag's birthday started in 1885 when school teacher, BJ Cigrand, organized a group of Wisconsin school children to observe June 14 as the anniversary of the official adoption of the Flag's Birthday. Cigrand, became known as the 'Father of Flag Day,' he continued to publicly advocate the observance of June 14 as the flag's 'birthday', or 'Flag Day' for years.

In addition, a few years later the efforts of another school teacher, George Balch, led to the formal observance of 'Flag Day' on June 14 by the New York State Board of Education. This began a trickle affect with as many as 36 state and local governments joining to adopted the annual observance. This day of observance remained as such for over 30 years.

In 1916, the anniversary of the Flag Resolution of 1777 became a nationally observed event by a proclamation by President Woodrow Wilson. But, was not designated as National Flag Day until August 3rd, 1949, when an Act of Congress designated June 14th of each year as National Flag Day.

Today, Flag Day is celebrated with parades, ceremonies, and picnics sponsored by veterans, schools, and groups such as the National Flag Day foundation whose goal is to preserve the traditions, history, pride, and respect which are due to our nation's symbol, Old Glory. Our flag stands for more then freedom, it stands for all those who gave their lives so that we, while here on earth, may live in peace.

Each year, we can enjoy Federal Holidays set aside specifically to honor our veterans. Sadly, too many of us often overlook these opportunities to pay our respect and recognize the sacrifice and service of these individuals. These days are intended to, express the sentiments of a grateful nation. Thus, I ask, what does it say of us when we forget, overlook, or simply brush aside the opportunity to honor the best among us?

I hope each of us are able to honor all our heroes, but not just on Veteran's Day, but this and any other day as well.

## **American Eagle Day**



The first American Eagle Day was proclaimed by President Bill Clinton in 1995. Since then, 41 American States have made the day an official observance. From 2007 onward, the US Senate has also passed resolutions to mark June 20th of the year as American Eagle Day.

The Bald Eagle was selected as the National Emblem by our country's Founding Fathers on June 20, 1782 by the Second Continental Congress.

For over 200 years, it has served as the pride of America and the living symbol of all we Americans stand for: Freedom, Courage, Strength, and Excellence.

The eagle is placed on the front side of the Great Seal of the United States and holds an olive branch in its right talon and 13 arrows in its left. The olive branch symbolizes the United States' commitment to peace and the arrows its readiness for war; the number of arrows refers to the original 13 states.



## **D-Day**



D-Day was the first day in one of the largest amphibious invasions to have ever been undertaken. It began on June 6, 1944, and launched Operation Overlord – an invasion against the Nazi-held Normandy coastline during World War 2 (1939-1945). It was launched with 160,000 troops, over 13,000 aircraft, and 5,000 ships. By the end of the day, American and Allied Soldiers had broken through the Nazi defenses and had a foothold in Normandy. This endeavor came at a great price. This day left over 9,000 Allied Soldiers and Paratroopers either wounded or killed, sacrifices which allowed the other 100,000 soldiers to complete the mission.

In the United States, D-Day is an observance day not a federal holiday. Most Americans observe this holiday by visiting museums with D-Day exhibits, or watch and participate in memorials and ceremonies given all over the country on June 6th.
