


THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE



In a June 7th, 1776 session, in the Pennsylvania State House, eventually renamed Independence Hall, of Virginia the Second Continental Congress committee presented a resolution (known as the Lee Resolution):


"Resolved: That these United Colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent states. That they are absolved from all allegiance to the British Crown. And, that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved."



A committee of five was appointed to draft the declaration, and the task of writing fell on Thomas Jefferson. Discussions of Jefferson's draft of the Declaration of Independence resulted in minor changes. The process by the Continental Congress began July 1st and continued through to July 4th, 1776, when the Declaration was officially adopted.

Philadelphia held the first annual commemoration of independence on July 4, 1777, while Congress was still occupied with the ongoing war.

George Washington issued double rations of rum to all his soldiers to mark the anniversary of independence in 1778. And, in 1781, several months before the key American victory at Yorktown, Massachusetts became the first State to make July 4th an official state holiday.

After the Revolutionary War, Americans continued to commemorate Independence Day every year. These celebrations allowed the new nation's emerging political leaders to address citizens and create a feeling of unity. Families often celebrate Independence Day by hosting or attending a picnic or barbecue to gather with relatives or friends. Decorations are colored red. white, and blue: the colors of the American Flag.

Masonic Friend to Friend Monument



The Battle of Gettysburg which took place from July 1st through July 3rd, 1863, is the most famous, most bloodied battle of the U.S. Civil War. Robert E. Lee lead his Confederate Army of Northern Virginia and invaded the Northern States.

Abraham Lincoln appointed Union Major General George G. Meade to lead the United States Army, with orders to prevent any attack on Washington, D.C., or Baltimore, Maryland.

On July 1st, the battle became a very large battle, and hard fought by both sides; which resulted in a Confederate victory that day. The Union Army regrouped on the hills and ridge south of Gettysburg, under the leadership of Major General Winfield Scott Hancock, one of the most widely admired generals of the Civil War and a brother of the Craft.

On July 2nd, General Lee attempted to defeat the Union Army by attacking both flanks in an enormously brutal battle resulting in thousands of casualties. One of the most significant events of the day was the defense of a hill called Little Round Top by a Maine regiment commanded by Brother Colonel Joshua Lawrence Chamberlain. His men ran out of ammunition and understanding a retreat may result in the defeat of the Union, Bro. Chamberlin ordered a bayonet charge and was victorious. For his efforts, he was awarded the Medal of Honor and gained the

notoriety which resulted in his being later elected Governor of Maine four times.

The battle climaxed on July 3rd. General Lee ordered a massive cannon attack and about 12,000 men to attack the center of the Union position. Among the leaders of this final battle, known as Pickett's Charge, was Confederate Brother Brigadier General Lewis Addison Armistead and Union Brother Major General Winfield Scott Hancock. Both career soldiers and friends before the war.

When the Confederate attack reached the Union line at Gettysburg, there was fierce fighting. Brother Armistead was shot twice and as he fell, gave a Masonic sign asking for assistance. A fellow Mason, a Union Brother Captain Henry H. Bingham came to Brother Armistead's assistance and offered to help. Brother Armistead reportedly asked to see and talk with his friend Brother Hancock, but he was informed, Brother Hancock had been badly wounded just a

few minutes earlier. Union Brother Bingham then helped Confederate Brother Armistead off the field and to a hospital, where he passed away two days later.

This is a moment in time that is a well recorded example of Freemasonry. This day, a Union soldier aided a Confederate soldier; both brothers of the Craft whom exemplified our masonic ideals.



In 1993, the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania completed and dedicated a monument on the Gettysburg National Cemetery, with the cooperation and support of the United States Government. It memorializes Brother Bingham assisting Brother Armistead. This statue is called


the "Masonic Friend to Friend Memorial".
