On November 10, 1775, prior to the Declaration of Independence, a new corps was formed following the Continental Marine Act and known as the Continental Marines. This military service branch held several different duties, but their primary purpose was to provide landing forces.

The first Commandant, Samuel Nicholas, led two battalions with over 2.100 servicemen.

After the Revolutionary War, the Continental Marines were disbanded. The Marine Corps was established on July 11, 1798; and this became the date upon which Marines would celebrate the founding of the Corps as an official entity. This changed in 1921 with Major Edwin North McClellan of the Marine Corps History Division who advocated for the anniversary to be designated on November 10th. This was part of an effort in a series of standardizations as to how celebrations of the Marine Corps' Birthday would be executed. Marines treat the anniversary with pride, importance, and honor.

The United States Marine Corps' birthday is celebrated with full military pageantry, pomp, and circumstance. These events change from time to time and by physical location. What does not change is the Cake Cutting Ceremony. This ceremony is performed with the same honor and distinction as a 21-Gun Salute. This tradition is so much embedded in the pride of a Marine that it was formalized in the Drill Manual in 1956. By tradition, and order, the first slice of cake is given to the oldest Marine present who then hands it to the youngest Marine present, symbolizing a passing of knowledge and tradition from wisest to newest. After the Cake Cutting Ceremony, there is a traditional reading of Marine Corps Order 47, which created the official holiday as a mandatory celebration. This is followed by the celebration. One cannot help but notice the symbolism we as Masons perform when Initiating, Passing, and Raising our brothers in Lodge and the reading of our Charter when installed as Master of the Lodge.

Happy Birthday Marines! May God keep and preserve you and all our Nation's Service Personnel while preserving the Freedom of our Republic.


From the Recorder's Desk





Nun: Oh, I'm so sorry, Officer, I didn't know that."


Then the police officer looked into the back seat and saw that the nuns there had panic-stricken faces and white knuckles from holding on to each other too tightly.




This was a fantastic afternoon with family and friends. We have been apart for much too long and it was a welcomed pleasure to be in your company. I hope to see you at the next event!

National Homemade Bread Day



National Homemade Bread Day is celebrated on November 17th. Bread has been made for over thousands of years and it is estimated that its origin goes back to 5,000-10,000 B.C. Bread is one food that knows no cultural bounds. Today, most households purchase bread and do not bake it themselves. Bread can be served as a snack, be eaten as a meal, or used as an ingredient for a different recipe altogether. Sliced bread was not available until 1928. When it was invented, it was described as the "best thing"; hence the popular saying, "best thing since sliced bread".

The best thing about National Homemade Bread Day is the way your home smells when baking the breads. Or, maybe it is when you eat the bread right out of the oven! Either way, bake bread on November 17th.

I have enclosed my recipe for Pumpkin Bread. An amazingly easy recipe which has great benefits. Pumpkin is packed with fiber, potassium, and Vitamin C. All factors that support heart health. Potassium helps treat hypertension or high blood pressure. It also



can reduce the risk of strokes and may prevent bones from losing muscle mass. Pumpkin is known to reduce diastolic blood pressure and increase the good cholesterol. It also boosts your immunity. The pumpkin fiber helps digest food efficiently which helps in keeping you regular. ENJOY!

PUMPKIN BREAD

<u>Ingredients</u>

- 2/3 cup of Butter Flavored Shortening
- 3 cups of sugar
- · 4 eggs
- 13/4 cups of canned pumpkin (small can)
- 2/3 cup of water
- 3 1/3 cups of flour
- 1 ½ teaspoons of salt
- 1/2 teaspoon of baking powder
- 2 teaspoons of baking soda
- 1 teaspoon of cinnamon powder
- ½ teaspoon of ground cloves

Directions

Mix flour, salt, and baking powder together in a bowl.

In a separate bowl, cream shortening and sugar, afterwards, add eggs one at a time while mixing. Add pumpkin, baking soda, cinnamon, cloves, and water. Mix well.

Add flour mixture (one cup at a time) to wet ingredients.

Mix smooth.

Put into 2 greased and floured bread pans. Bake at 350 degrees for about 1 hour and 15 minutes (check at the 1 hour). Bread will be done when a toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Let cool completely before cutting.




Almas Yacht Club
