HISTORY OF THANKSGIVING

Thanksgiving Day is a national holiday in the United States, and Thanksgiving 2022 occurs on Thursday, November 24. In 1621, the Plymouth colonists and the Wampanoag shared an autumn harvest feast that is acknowledged today as one of the first Thanksgiving celebrations in the colonies. For more than two centuries, days of thanksgiving were celebrated by individual colonies and states. It wasn't until 1863, in the midst of the Civil War, that President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed a national Thanksgiving Day to be held each November.

In September 1620, a small ship called the Mayflower left Plymouth, England, carrying 102 passengers—an assortment of religious separatists seeking a new home where they could freely practice their faith and other individuals lured by the promise of prosperity and land ownership in the "New World." After a treacherous and uncomfortable crossing that lasted 66 days, they dropped anchor near the tip of Cape Cod, far north of their intended destination at the mouth of the Hudson River. One month later, the Mayflower crossed Massachusetts Bay, where the Pilgrims, as they are now commonly known, began the work of establishing a village at Plymouth.

Throughout that first brutal winter, most of the colonists remained on board the ship, where they suffered from exposure, scurvy and outbreaks of contagious disease. Only half of the Mayflower's original passengers and crew lived to see their first New England spring. In March, the remaining settlers moved ashore, where they received an astonishing visit from a member of the Abenaki tribe who greeted them in English.

Several days later, he returned with another Native American, Squanto, a member of the Pawtuxet tribe who had been kidnapped by an English sea captain and sold into slavery before escaping to London and returning to his homeland on an exploratory expedition. Squanto taught the Pilgrims, weakened by malnutrition and illness, how to cultivate corn, extract sap from maple trees, catch fish in the rivers and avoid poisonous plants. He also helped the settlers forge an alliance with the Wampanoag, a local tribe, which would endure for more than 50 years and tragically remains one of the sole examples of harmony between European colonists and Native Americans.

In November 1621, after the Pilgrims' first corn harvest proved successful, Governor William Bradford organized a celebratory feast and invited a group of the fledgling colony's Native American allies, including the Wampanoag chief Massasoit. Now remembered as American's "first Thanksgiving"—although the Pilgrims themselves may not have used the term at the time—the festival lasted for three days. While no record exists of the first Thanksgiving's exact menu, much of what we know about what happened at the first Thanksgiving comes from Pilgrim chronicler Edward Winslow, who wrote:

"Our harvest being gotten in, our governor sent four men on fowling, that so we might after a special manner rejoice together, after we had gathered the fruits of our labors; they four in one day killed as much fowl, as with a little help beside, served the Company almost a week, at which time amongst other Recreations, we exercised our Arms, many of the Indians coming amongst us, and amongst the rest their greatest king Massasoit, with some ninety men, whom for three days we entertained and feasted, and they went out and killed five Deer, which they brought to the Plantation and bestowed on our Governor, and upon the Captain and others. And although it be not always so plentiful, as it was at this time with us, yet by the goodness of God, we are so far from want, that we often wish you partakers of our plenty."

Historians have suggested that many of the dishes were likely prepared using traditional Native American spices and cooking methods. Because the Pilgrims had no oven and the Mayflower's sugar supply had dwindled by the fall of 1621, the meal did not feature pies, cakes or other desserts, which have become a hallmark of contemporary celebrations

Thanksgiving Becomes a National Holiday

Pilgrims held their second Thanksgiving celebration in 1623 to mark the end of a long drought that had threatened the year's harvest and prompted Governor Bradford to call for a religious fast. Days of fasting and thanksgiving on an annual or occasional basis became common practice in other New England settlements as well.



AMERICA'S FREEDOMS

The Origins of Veterans Day



2006 Veterans Day Poster

In 1921, an unknown World War I American soldier was buried in Arlington National Cemetery. This site, on a hillside overlooking the Potomac River and the city of Washington, D.C., became the focal point of reverence for America's veterans.

Similar ceremonies occurred earlier in England and France, where an unknown soldier was buried in each nation's highest place of honor (in England, Westminster Abbey; in France, the Arc de Triomphe). These memorial gestures all took place on November 11, giving universal recognition to the celebrated ending of World War I fighting at 11 a.m., November 11, 1918 (the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month). The day became known as "Armistice Day.

Armistice Day officially received its name in America in 1926 through a Congressional resolution. It became a national holiday 12 years later by similar Congressional action. If the idealistic hope had been realized that World War I was "the War to end all wars," November 11 might still be called Armistice Day. But only a few years after the holiday was proclaimed, war broke out in Europe. Sixteen and one-half million Americans took part. Four hundred seven thousand of them died in service, more than 292,000 in battle.

Armistice Day Changed To Honor All Veterans

The first celebration using the term Veterans Day occurred in Birmingham, Alabama, in 1947. Raymond Weeks, a World War II veteran, organized "National Veterans Day," which included a parade and other festivities, to honor all veterans. The event was held

on November 11, then designated Armistice Day. Later, U.S. Representative Edward

Rees of Kansas proposed a bill that would change Armistice Day to Veterans Day. In 1954, Congress passed the bill that President Eisenhower signed proclaiming November 11 as Veterans Day. Raymond Weeks received the Presidential Citizens Medal from President Reagan in November 1982. Weeks' local parade and ceremonies are now an annual event celebrated nationwide.

On Memorial Day 1958, two more unidentified American war dead were brought from overseas and interred in the plaza beside the unknown soldier of World War I. One was killed in World War II, the other in the Korean War. In 1984, an unknown serviceman from the Vietnam War was placed alongside the others. The remains from Vietnam were exhumed May 14, 1998, identified as Air Force 1st Lt. Michael Joseph Blassie, and removed for burial. To honor these men, symbolic of all Americans who gave their lives in all wars, an Army honor guard, the 3rd U.S. Infantry (The Old Guard), keeps day and night vigil.

A law passed in 1968 changed the national commemoration of Veterans Day to the fourth Monday in October. It soon became apparent, however, that November 11 was a date of historic significance to many Americans. Therefore, in 1978 Congress returned the observance to its traditional date.

National Ceremonies Held at Arlington

National Cemetery The focal point for official, national ceremonies for Veterans Day continues to be the memorial amphitheater built around the Tomb of the Unknowns. At 11 a.m. on November 11, a combined color guard representing all military services executes "Present Arms" at the tomb. The nation's tribute to its war dead is symbolized by the laying of a presidential wreath. The bugler plays "taps." The rest of the ceremony takes place in the amphitheater.

Veterans Day ceremonies at Arlington and elsewhere are coordinated by the President's Veterans Day National Committee. Chaired by the Secretary of Veterans Affairs, the committee represents national veterans organizations.

Governors of many states and U.S. territories appoint Veterans Day chairpersons who, in cooperation with the National Committee and the Department of Defense, arrange and promote local ceremonies.

CLASSIC ROAST TURKEY

INGREDIENTS

12 to 14lb Whole Turkey (neck and giblets removed)

Kosher Salt

Freshly ground black pepper

1 onion, cut into wedges

1 bunch thyme

Small handful of rosemary sprigs

1 small handful sage leaves

1 head garlic, halved crosswise

1/2 c. melted butter

2 c. chicken broth



DIRECTIONS

- 1. Position rack to the lower third of your oven and preheat oven to 450°.
- 2. Pat turkey dry with paper towels and season the cavity generously with salt and pepper.
- 3. Stuff the cavity with onion, thyme, rosemary, sage and garlic.
- 4. Tie the legs together with kitchen twine and tuck the wing tips under the body.
- 5. Brush butter all over turkey then season generously with salt and pepper.
- 6. Place turkey breast side up on a roasting rack inside of a large pan.
- 7. Pour chicken broth into the pan.
- 8. Transfer to oven and immediately reduce oven heat to 350°.
- 9. Baste every 30 to 45 minutes with the juices on the bottom of the pan, and roast for 3 to 4 hours, or until the juices run clear when you cut between the leg and thigh. (The meat temperature should be 165°).
- 10. Cover cooked turkey with aluminum foil and let rest for 20 minutes before carving.

INGREDIENTS

- 4 cups of broccoli steamed
- 1 cup of heavy cream
- 1 1/2 cups of shredded sharp cheese
- 1 tsp onion powder
- 1 tsp garlic powder
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/2 tsp black pepper

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. spray 9 X 13 in pan with Pam or lightly coat with olive oil
- 2. put broccoli in the bottom of the pan
- 3. mix all other ingredients
- 4. evenly spread mixture over broccoli
- 5. bake at 350 degrees until not runny and lightly brown on top (about 20 minutes



KEY LIME CHEESECAKE MOUSSE

4 SERVINGS

INGREDIENTS

- 8 oz cream cheese, room temperature
- 1 cup heavy cream
- 6 tbsp powdered erythritol or sugar
- 2 Tbsp key lime juice, or to taste
- 2 tsp lime zest, or to taste

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Whip the heavy cream with an mixer in bowl #1 until stiff peaks form.
- 2. In bowl #2, beat the cream cheese, erythritol or sugar, lime juice, and zest.
- 3. Combine the two mixtures and beat until just blended.
- 4. Spoon into 4 cups or bowls and top with additional lime zest, if desired.







APPLE HARVEST POUND CAKE WITH CARAMEL GLAZE

INGREDIENTS

- 2 cup white sugar
- 1½ cup vegetable oil
- 2 tsp vanilla extract
- 3 egg
- 3 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 tsp baking soda
- ½ tsp ground cinnamon
- 1 tsp salt
- 2 medium Granny Smith apple, peeled, cored and chopped
- 1 cup chopped walnuts
- ½ cup butter, or margarine
- 2 tsp milk
- ½ cup brown sugar

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Grease a 9 inch Bundt pan.
- 2. In a large bowl, beat the sugar, oil, vanilla and eggs with an electric mixer until light and fluffy. Combine the flour, baking soda, cinnamon and salt; stir into the batter just until blended. Fold in the apples and walnuts using a spoon. Pour into the prepared pan.
- 3. Bake for 1 hour and 20 minutes in the preheated oven, until a toothpick inserted into the crown or the cake comes out clean. Allow to cool for about 20 minutes then invert on to a wire rack.
- 4. Make the glaze by heating the butter, milk and brown sugar in a small saucepan over medium heat. Bring to a boil, stirring to dissolve the sugar, then remove from the heat.

Drizzle over the warm cake. I like to place a sheet of aluminum foil under the cooling rack to catch the drips for easy clean up.

SNOW BEAR

INGREDIENTS

- 1 to 1 1/2 oz of Amaretto
- 1 to 1 1/2 oz of Peach Schnapps
- 4 ounces of vanilla ice cream
- 2 ounces of milk

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. add all ingredients to a 10 ounce glass
- 2. stir until all ingredients are partially blended together (optional: top with a small scoop of ice cream)

FRUIT MARTINI

INGREDIENTS

- 2 oz of Raspberry liquor
- 2 oz of Peach Schnapps
- 1 oz of vanilla vodka
- 4 6 ice cubes
- 4 raspberries

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. add first 4 ingredients to a martini shaker
- 2. shake and drain into glass without the ice
- 3. garnish with raspberries and blackberries on a skewer

PINK SQUIRREL

INGREDIENTS

- 1 Ounce Crème de Almond (Crème de Noyaux)
- 1 Ounce White Crème de Cacao
- 2 scoops vanilla ice cream
- Maraschino cherries and whipped cream for garnishing

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. add first 3 ingredients to a martini shaker
- 2. garnish with Maraschino cherries and whipped cream for garnishing



TROPICAL MOSCOW MULE

INGREDIENTS

- 1 oz coconut rum (such as Malibu)
- 1 oz vodka
- 4 oz ginger beer
- 4 oz pineapple juice
- 1 TBSP lime juice

INSTRUCTIONS

1. Mix all the ingredients together and serve over ice.


